From the Pastor

As many of you know, Cathy and I recently traveled to Germany. A big part of the trip was sightseeing related to the 500th anniversary of Martin Luther's Ninety-Five Thesis. If there was a moment that gave rise to what we know as the Protestant church, it was the day before All Saints Day in 1517

when an Augustinian monk serving a church in Wittenberg Germany posted ninety-five objections to the doctrine and practice of the prevailing church as he understood and experienced it. Martin Luther was particularly concerned with the sale of indulgences: money paid to expedite penance for sins. Luther knew from experience that when indulgences were sold in his parish, the people didn't go to confession; how, reasoned Luther, could there be forgiveness without confession, repentance and contrition? Luther was hoping to invite an academic conversation about these ninety-five points; hence, he posted his objections at the university church rather than his parish church. It is only from our vantage point that we understand that Luther's actions ignited a revolution that changed his world and shaped ours.

Before we embarked on our Luther tour, we spent an afternoon at the Gutenberg museum in Mainz. I had never made the connection between the invention of movable type and the other technologies that combined to make the printed word available to common people in Luther's day and the Reformation. If there had been no printing press, then the Ninety-Five Thesis would have remained a local conversation limited to the churches and university in Wittenberg. It was the printing press that allowed Luther's thoughts to spread throughout the German speaking world in a few weeks and gave Martin Luther a voice far greater

than his ecclesiastical or academic stature suggested. The Reformation was really several things intertwining: a new technology found an ideal application in an important conversation.

I think we live in a time very much like Luther's. Communication technology has been shrinking the world steadily over the past century and has now been democratized to the point that anyone can communicate with anyone else on our planet in real time using a handheld device. Many of the questions that swirl in the Ninety-Five Thesis are still in play today: what is the relationship between faith and works? Can I do anything that will earn the favor of God? Who has the authority to remit sins and give expression to the voice of God in our world? Those were the questions five hundred years ago; they are still important questions today.

I came away from my time in Germany impressed at what happens when ideas and technologies combine in new and original ways. Five hundred years ago this October 31st, that combination changed the arc of European history. In all likelihood, the same kind of profound changes are afoot in our place and time. Martin Luther is remembered for his ideas and for his ability to bring new tools to bear upon his cause. May God grant to us in our time the wisdom to bring new technology to bear on many of the same questions that first set Luther afire half a millennia ago.

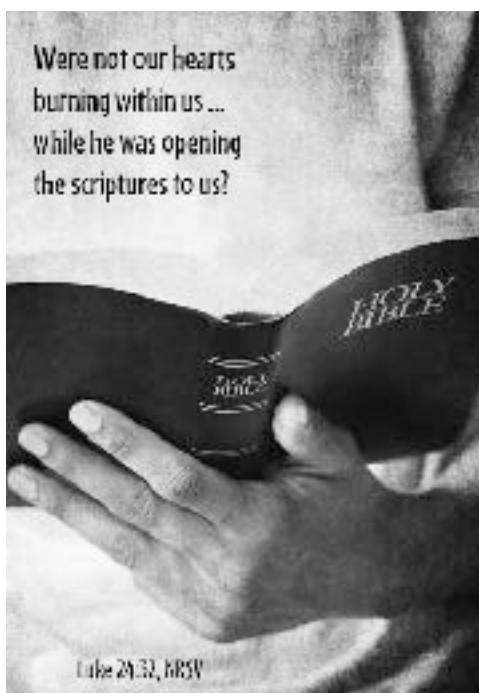

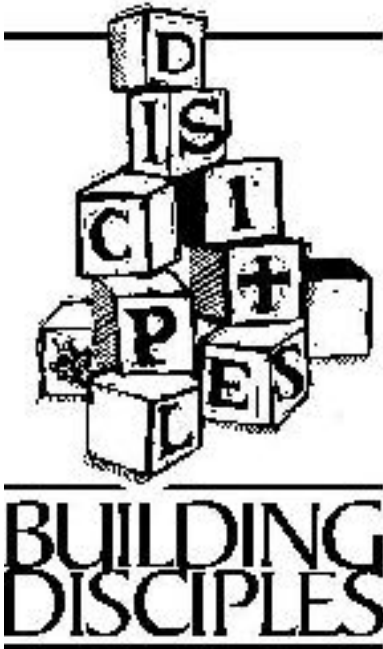

In the *Discovery Zone* hour, Pastor Clint leads the gathering bible story time in Fellowship Hall. The opening is about 15-20 minutes, the youth then break in to their groups and the adults join with Pastor



Clint in the Adult Classroom. Everyone has the opportunity to learn corporately on Sunday morning as families together, learning the same message. We must always have volunteers assist us so that we can maintain two adults in every classroom on a weekly basis.

An additional paid child care worker is being sought out to assist Marlene in the nursery each week for two hours on Sunday morning. If you know of someone 18 years of age or older that might be interested in this position, please let Wendy or Marnie know. We are currently checking with the local colleges inquiring if they have students in need of child care credits.

Children are staying in the Sanctuary during the worship service. Kids under second grade are being supervised at the table located in the back of the Sanctuary, after the Children's Time portion of the worship service. For children older than second grade, blue busy bags are available at the table, they have coloring pages and work



sheets inside. The weekly context of the learning material offered in them is the same biblical context as the Discovery Zone material.

The Middle School and High School youth groups are now meeting with Giovanna every Sunday evening. The Middle Schoolers meet from 5:30-6:30 p.m. and the High Schoolers meet from 7:00-8:00 p.m. If you would be interested in sitting in with Giovanna on a youth meeting or accompanying them on an outreach event please let her know. She is always looking for adult volunteers to join them.

On Friday, November 3rd from 7:00 p.m. until 10:00 a.m. Saturday morning November 4th the middle and high school aged youth will meet at the church for an overnight lock in. Dinner and breakfast will be provided as well as a variety of fun activities.

November 11th at 10 a.m. all ages young and old are welcome to join the youth in a *Harry Potter Movie Marathon* viewing in the sanctuary. Two Harry Potter movies will be shown.

The High School youth go on their first outreach trip November 12th at 11a.m. They will go to Ronald McDonald House in Detroit. Lunch will be served to families of children with serious illness that are patients at Children's Hospital. They will return to the church around 2:00 p.m.

The Middle School and High School youth will also be hosting an untraditional holiday tea on November 12th at 4:00 p.m. The theme chosen for the tea is *Nightmare Before Christmas*. The kids are putting a new and different spin on the traditional tea. Please come enjoy the program they have in store for you.

The younger youth ages K-5 will be making Christmas ornaments in Fellowship Hall on November 17th at 6:30 p.m.

Expressions

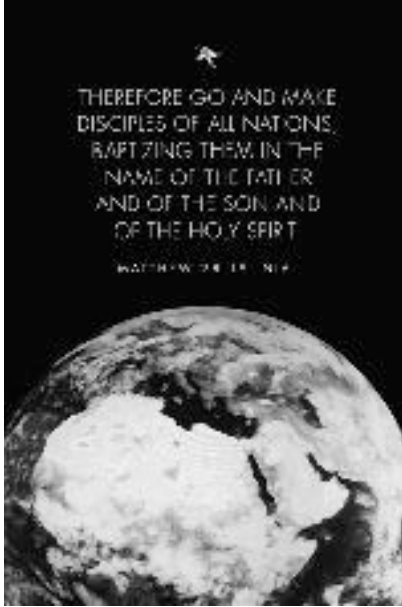
