
From the Pastor And Then Nothing Changed

The Easter narratives in the Gospels take unusual twists: Jesus, no longer bound by the tomb, appears to his followers in a variety of times and places, but with little visible results. You would have thought (and we sometimes read the gospels as though) those early followers in the days immediately after the resurrection would go out and spread the news of Jesus' life-after-life through the whole region around Jerusalem; and you would be wrong. The immediate post-resurrection narratives are about some personal business yet to be finished. Thomas won't take people's words and experiences at face value, and so Jesus satisfies Thomas' doubts. Peter and the inner circle are so guilt wracked that the resurrected Christ only serves to remind them of their failure and empty words. The Gospel of John devotes its final chapter to Jesus healing of Peter's soul. The post-resurrection Jesus spends much of his time as he had during his formal ministry: healing, encouraging, teaching.

None of this should surprise us. Jesus tells us that God's work in our life is like yeast working in dough. Slowly the yeast does its work; at first the results cannot be seen, and later even the observable changes happen slowly. The post-Easter narratives are about this slow, gradual change. If our lives mirror the lives of Jesus' first followers, then April the second (the Monday after Easter) won't be too different from March 31st. The work of

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Easter, our inclusion in God's New Creation begun on Easter morning, is the stuff of slow gradual change.

When we go back to the Gospels, we find out that there are a whole series of things that happen because of Easter, and that it is Easter and those subsequent events that change the disciples into the Apostles of the early church. Jesus ascends to be present with the Father, and in celebration of that ascension the third person of the Triune God takes up residence in Jesus' followers. Pentecost is that moment when the yeast explodes in the dough. Now we're in the book of Acts where we barely recognize the disciples of the Gospels. Peter, he who couldn't even claim to be Jesus' follower to a group of onlookers around a fire, stands in the Temple where Jesus had taught and tells all of Israel about the resurrected Messiah. It is critical for us to understand that the Peter of Acts 2 didn't happen overnight. He is transformed, healed by the risen Christ in a process that was at times intensely painful. Only when the inner healing happens is Peter given the Spirit which completes his transformation.

The world does change after Easter, but the changes start slow and work from the inside out. Like Jesus' first followers, if we are to be disciples of the risen Christ then we need to watch, wait, pray, look. The risen Christ gives us the same gifts he poured out on his followers on that first Pentecost: the Holy Spirit and gifts for service. For now, watch and pray. Change is coming, it is happening slowly even now. The Spirit comes, change explodes. It is coming.

We are always in need of a few more consistent volunteers to assist Marlene Jones in the Nursery during Discovery Zone or the worship service. Extra help is definitely needed on May 6th, so that Marlene can enjoy time off to vacation with her family. Signup sheets are available either in the nursery or fellowship hall.

On Easter Sunday, Discovery Zone will not be offered. The Easter Pancake Breakfast will take place instead from 9:00 to 10:30am. Pancake breakfast will be provided by Chef Rich, Giovanna, Tony and the middle school and high school youth. Donations made to the breakfast will support the youth "Feet to Faith" mission trip planned for July 23rd through 27th in Canfield, Ohio. Both urban and rural mission sites are offered to middle school and high school youth. There are 7 middle/high school aged youth, 4 college age and 4 sponsors attending. Well I am sure everyone is well aware of the flood. Rest assured that we are working on a plan of attack. When the insurance check comes in we will be ready to start work. There are 3 areas we will be working on. The nursery was hardest hit, also the handicapped restroom took a pretty good lick, and the floor in Pastor Clint's office. We will be doing the bulk of the work ourselves. The carpet in the nursery and the floor in the pastors office are the only things we plan to contract out.

We are having our spring clean up on Sat. May 5 at 10am. We are also having our annual garage sale on May 19. We will be accepting donations at the garage on Wednesdays 4/25, 5/2, 5/9, 5/16 @ 6-8pm. If you have anything to donate please help us out. Please reserve clothing donations for the clothes swap later in the year.

Expressions

The Expressions committee is currently researching the idea of having a Clothes Closet set up at a local elementary or middle school. We plan to visit one that is currently operational in Trenton to use as a guide, and then continue to further plans with one of our own at one of the neighborhood schools. This will be an ongoing project to support, once we get established - the goal is to have something in place and ready to go before the Fall.

Our Spring/Lenten Project will be centered on supporting our friends at the Ilturisho School again. Feast in the Desert kicked off on Sun, Feb 18th where we saw some photos of meals that the children take at the school. We also had some examples afterwards and the weeks following for everyone to sample exactly as they eat it. The recipes came right from the leaders at the school – there were 3 dishes, Ugali (Corn based meal), Beans w/ Tomatoes, and a Corn Meal Mash. It was quite an experience to taste a sample of what they eat every single day and even more amazing that they eat this meal at a cost of only \$0.07/meal.

Due to the drought they are experiencing over there currently, and the lack of options to eat, we continue to take a collection during Lent through Easter to send over to the children at the Ilturisho School. There are Fish boxes that you can take to do a daily collection, reflecting at each meal you take vs. the meal they take – again, their meal only costs \$0.07 – were you able to eat a meal at just that cost??

We also still have envelopes in the narthex marked 'Feast in the Desert' to take if you would like to donate in that fashion. We have collected $\sim 500 to date and hope to raise close to \$1000 as our goal by Easter to send over to the school.

The impact we are having on these children is immeasurable – we already have received word once this season from the head school master that enrollment is up directly related to the fact that food is

available to eat for those attending, all because of funds we have already sent. This is truly God's work in progress!!
